

MANAGEMENT OF SICK OR INFECTIOUS CHILDREN GUIDELINES

Aims: To ensure that sick children are cared for swiftly and that appropriate action is taken to prevent the spread of infection.

- To minimise the risk of cross infection.
- To effectively manage and outbreak of an infectious disease in the service/
- To use "Staying Healthy Preventing infectious diseases in early childhood education and care services 5th Edition, as a guide in matters relating to sick or infectious children, symptoms and exclusions.

- To comply with any directives from "Population Health" with respect to exclusion periods of children with certain symptoms.
- To clarify that the Responsible Person on duty at the Service has the ultimate responsibility for implementation of the Exclusion Guidelines in Staying Healthy to minimise any risk to other children and families attending the Service.
- The Responsible Person will consider a Dr's alternative diagnosis if provided on the attached form which aims to assist the Doctor to diagnose by giving the context of the Service's decision.
- To communicate effectively with families about illnesses present in the Service.

Explanation: The major elements of an effective infection control policy include the maintenance of high standards of hygiene, health practices and adherence to exclusion guidelines. For this reason, as well as the extra demands sick children place on staff resources, the service cannot provide care for ill children or those who are or may be contagious.

Implementation: If a child exhibits signs or symptoms of illness, educators will:

- a. Inform the Responsible Person and will contact the child's parent. Where the parent cannot be contacted their emergency contacts will be asked to collect the child.
- b. If child becomes seriously ill an ambulance will be called in addition to the child's parents or guardians.
- c. Comfort the sick child. Separate the sick child from other children until the child is collected.
- d. Take the child's temperature and act to bring down fever as necessary. See following notes.
- e. Inform the person collecting the child of any current illnesses in the service and the conditions of re-entry to the service as detailed on 'Staying Healthy". Where relevant, give copy of information from "Staying Healthy" as well as the form for the family to present to a Doctor if they are requesting an opinion/ diagnosis from a Doctor. See details below.
- When a child arrives at the service and, in the opinion of the Responsible Person is too sick to be
 in attendance or has not met the criteria for readmission as detailed in "Staying Healthy" the
 parents will be asked to take the child home.



- Children do not need a Doctor's clearance to return, if in the opinion of the Responsible Person
 at the Centre, they no longer exhibit any of the symptoms for exclusion, as detailed in 'Staying
 Healthy", except in relation to infectious disease listed at end of this policy.
- If families contest the decision made by the Responsible Person they may present the attached
 form, which details the symptoms the Service identified, as well as the current history of the
 condition at the Service to a Dr for his/her diagnosis to be recorded on the form and return the
 form to the Service. The Responsible person will then consider the doctors diagnosis in
 conjunction with the current symptoms being exhibited by the child.

"Care services will not be influenced by letters from doctors stating that the child can return to care, unless the child's condition fulfils the service's criteria for returning to care". Quote from National Health and Medical Research Council Information for Families- Exclusion Period Explained.

- Possible contagious illnesses are to be recorded on an illness chart so that details can be tracked.
- When 2 or more related cases (eg in same room) of vomiting or diarrhoea have been identified the Population Health Service is to be notified as is ACECQA via NQAITS
- Where infectious diseases are impacting the Service, families need to be made aware using Storypark and any foyer noticeboards used by the Service.
- If there are a number of cases the Service should consider sending to families via Storypark a
 copy of this policy, which includes a copy of the letter to a Doctor who might be asked to give an
 alternative diagnosis, and a copy of "Information for Families- Exclusion Period Explained"
 available from the following site or attached to this policy.

- The service will retain the right to exclude any child who is regarded by the Responsible Person to be a health risk to other children, because they are still exhibiting the symptoms described for exclusion as detailed in "Staying Healthy" or any child who is obviously unwell.
 - Ensure the care environment has been cleaned thoroughly and as immediately as possible, after the identification of any child with symptoms that might be infectious to others in the care environment.
 - Under the Public Health (Amendment) Act, the Nominated Supervisor will contact the Public Health Unit:
 - **o** When any case of the following occurs in the service diphtheria, measles, mumps, poliomyelitis, rubella, whooping cough, tetanus, meningitis.
 - A medical certificate is required for any child or adult having diphtheria, hepatitis A, polio, tuberculosis, typhoid or paratyphoid before re-entry to the program.
- Where serious infections or major outbreaks occur, the Nominated Supervisor will seek the advice of the Public Health Unit and issue families with a letter advising them of prevention and action to be taken.
- Staff must follow the procedures for bodily fluids, hand washing, cleaning and first aid.
- Sores should be covered. Weeping may result in exclusion until sore is healed.
